**Topic:** Final Action for CalPERS Contract Amendment for COLA Increase

#### **Summary**

On March 22, 2024, the Board approved the CalPERS Resolution of Intention to amend the existing contract between the District and CalPERS. The contract amendment will increase the CalPERS cost-of-living allowance (COLA) for all District plans from 2.0% to 3.0% effective May 1, 2024. Approval of final documents is required from the Board to complete the proposed amendment.

#### Discussion

CalPERS requires a 20-day waiting period following the Board's approval of the Resolution of Intention before allowing for the final resolution and contract amendment approval. The Amendment to Contract and Resolution 2024-03 are provided for Board review and approval as the 20-day waiting period expired on April 10, 2024. Other certifying documents are also included for your review, but they do not require formal approval.

There have been no changes to the approximate increase in future annual costs since they were presented to the Board on March 22, 2024.

#### Conclusion

Staff recommends that the Board approve the Amendment to Contract and Resolution 2024-03 as presented.

Thank you for returning the Resolution of Intention to amend your CalPERS retirement contract to provide Section 21335 (3% Annual Cost-of Living Allowance Increase) for service credit accumulated on and after the effective date of this amendment to contract for local miscellaneous members and local safety members.

Also provided are the following documents necessary to complete the proposed amendment:

- 1. Amendment to Contract, two original sets.
- Resolution, Form CON-13. This Resolution must be adopted by affirmative vote of a
  majority of the members of the governing body no earlier than twenty days after the
  adoption of the Resolution of Intention. Failure to comply may result in the delay of the
  anticipated effective date of the amendment.
- Certification of Final Action of Governing Body, Form CON-5.
- 4. Acknowledgement in Compliance with Government Code Section 7507(d), Form CON-12D.

Your agency adopted the Resolution of Intention on March 22, 2024, therefore, the <u>earliest date</u> the final Resolution could have been adopted was April 11, 2024, pursuant to Government Code Section 20471. There are no exceptions to this law.

Effective January 1, 2009 Government Code Section 7507 requires the following:

- A local public agency's chief executive officer acknowledge in writing that he or she understands the current and future cost of the retirement benefit as determined by the actuary.
- Adoption of any retirement benefit not be placed on the consent calendar.

The agency is to certify compliance on the enclosed Acknowledgement in Compliance with Government Code Section 7507(d), Form CON-12D.

# AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT

Between the
Board of Administration
California Public Employees' Retirement System
and the
Board of Directors
Montecito Fire Protection District

The Board of Administration, California Public Employees' Retirement System, hereinafter referred to as Board, and the governing body of the above public agency, hereinafter referred to as Public Agency, having entered into a contract effective July 1, 1944, and witnessed July 11, 1944, and as amended effective October 1, 1951, March 1, 1958, June 1, 1958, February 1, 1960, July 1, 1961, February 1, 1969, November 1, 1972, October 1, 1973, August 1, 1977, February 16, 1978, January 15, 1980, June 1, 1981, October 16, 1982, October 16, 1984, December 16, 1986, October 1, 1988, October 16, 1990, September 1, 1991, January 1, 2001, May 1, 2001, October 1, 2001, July 1, 2002, December 1, 2012, January 1, 2017, July 1, 2017, and July 1, 2018, which provides for participation of Public Agency in said System, Board and Public Agency hereby agree as follows:

- A. Paragraphs 1 through 16 are hereby stricken from said contract as executed effective July 1, 2018, and hereby replaced by the following paragraphs numbered 1 through 16 inclusive:
  - All words and terms used herein which are defined in the Public Employees' Retirement Law shall have the meaning as defined therein unless otherwise specifically provided. "Normal retirement age" shall mean age 60 for classic local miscellaneous members, age 62 for new local miscellaneous members, age 55 for classic local safety members, and age 57 for new local safety members.

- 2. Public Agency shall participate in the Public Employees' Retirement System from and after July 1, 1944, making its employees as hereinafter provided, members of said System subject to all provisions of the Public Employees' Retirement Law except such as apply only on election of a contracting agency and are not provided for herein and to all amendments to said Law hereafter enacted except those, which by express provisions thereof, apply only on the election of a contracting agency.
- 3. Public Agency agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and its trustees, agents and employees, the CalPERS Board of Administration, and the California Public Employees' Retirement Fund from any claims, demands, actions, losses, liabilities, damages, judgments, expenses and costs, including but not limited to interest, penalties and attorney fees that may arise as a result of any of the following:
  - (a) Public Agency's election to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas under this Contract that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under the Public Agency's prior non-CalPERS retirement program.
  - (b) Any dispute, disagreement, claim, or proceeding (including without limitation arbitration, administrative hearing, or litigation) between Public Agency and its employees (or their representatives) which relates to Public Agency's election to amend this Contract to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas that are different than such employees' existing retirement benefits, provisions or formulas.
  - (c) Public Agency's agreement with a third party other than CalPERS to provide retirement benefits, provisions, or formulas that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under this Contract and provided for under the California Public Employees' Retirement Law.
- 4. Employees of Public Agency in the following classes shall become members of said Retirement System except such in each such class as are excluded by law or this agreement:
  - a. Local Fire Fighters (herein referred to as local safety members);
  - b. Employees other than local safety members (herein referred to as local miscellaneous members).

5. In addition to the classes of employees excluded from membership by said Retirement Law, the following classes of employees shall not become members of said Retirement System:

#### a. POLICE OFFICERS.

- 6. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local miscellaneous member in employment before and not on or after July 1, 2002, shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354 of said Retirement Law (2% at age 55 Full).
- 7. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local miscellaneous member in employment on or after July 1, 2002, shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354.3 of said Retirement Law (3% at age 60 Full).
- 8. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a new local miscellaneous member shall be determined in accordance with Section 7522.20 of said Retirement Law (2% at age 62 Full).
- 9. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local safety member shall be determined in accordance with Section 21363.1 of said Retirement Law (3% at age 55 Full).
- 10. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a new local safety member shall be determined in accordance with Section 7522.25(d) of said Retirement Law (2.7% at age 57 Full).
- 11. Public Agency elected and elects to be subject to the following optional provisions:
  - a. Section 21573 (Third Level of 1959 Survivor Benefits).
  - b. Sections 21624 and 21626 (Post-Retirement Survivor Allowance).
  - c. Section 21222.1 (One-Time 5% Increase 1970). Legislation repealed said Section effective January 1, 1980.
  - d. Section 20965 (Credit for Unused Sick Leave).

- e. Section 21325 (One-Time 3% to 15% Increase For Local safety Members Who Retired or Died Prior to January 1, 1974). Legislation repealed said Section effective January 1, 2002.
- f. Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) for classic members only.
- g. Section 20692 (Employer Paid Member Contributions Converted to Payrate During the Final Compensation Period) for classic local miscellaneous members only.
- h. Section 21328 (One-Time 1% to 6% Increase For Local miscellaneous Members Who Retired or Died Prior to January 1, 1998).
- i. Section 20516 (Employees Sharing Cost of Additional Benefits):

Section 21354.3 (3% @ 60 Full formula) effective July 1, 2002, for classic local miscellaneous members.

From and after July 1, 2002, and until January 1, 2017, the classic miscellaneous employees of Public Agency shall be assessed an additional 4.5% of their compensation for a total contribution rate of 12.5% pursuant to Government Code Section 20516.

Section 21363.1 (3% @ 55 Full formula) effective January 1, 2001, for classic local safety members.

From and after January 1, 2001, and until January 1, 2017, the classic fire employees of Public Agency shall be assessed an additional 4.5% of their compensation for a total contribution rate of 13.5% pursuant to Government Code Section 20516.

j. Section 20516 (Employees Sharing Additional Cost):

From and after January 1, 2017, and until July 1, 2017, 6.5% for classic local miscellaneous members and classic local safety members.

From and after July 1, 2017, and until July 1, 2018, 8.5% for classic local miscellaneous members and classic local safety members.

From and after July 1, 2018, 10.5% for classic local miscellaneous members and classic local safety members.

The portion of the employer's contribution that the member agrees to contribute from his or her compensation, over and above the member's normal contribution ("Cost Sharing Percentage"), shall not exceed the Employer Normal Cost Rate, as that rate is defined in the CalPERS Actuarial Valuation for the relevant fiscal year. If the Cost Sharing Percentage will exceed the relevant Employer Normal Cost Rate, the Cost Sharing Percentage shall automatically be reduced to an amount equal to, and not to exceed, the Employer Normal Cost Rate for the relevant fiscal year.

- k. Section 21335 (3% Cost-of-Living Allowance, base year 2022) for service credit accumulated on and after the effective date of this amendment to contract.
- 12. Public Agency, in accordance with Government Code Section 20834, shall not be considered an "employer" for purposes of the Public Employees' Retirement Law. Contributions of the Public Agency shall be fixed and determined as provided in Government Code Section 20834, and such contributions hereafter made shall be held by the Board as provided in Government Code Section 20834.
- 13. Public Agency shall contribute to said Retirement System the contributions determined by actuarial valuations of prior and future service liability with respect to local miscellaneous members and local safety members of said Retirement System.
- 14. Public Agency shall also contribute to said Retirement System as follows:
  - a. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment within 60 days of date of contract to cover the costs of administering said System as it affects the employees of Public Agency, not including the costs of special valuations or of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
  - b. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment as the occasions arise, to cover the costs of special valuations on account of employees of Public Agency, and costs of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.

- 15. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be subject to adjustment by Board on account of amendments to the Public Employees' Retirement Law, and on account of the experience under the Retirement System as determined by the periodic investigation and valuation required by said Retirement Law.
- 16. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be paid by Public Agency to the Retirement System within fifteen days after the end of the period to which said contributions refer or as may be prescribed by Board regulation. If more or less than the correct amount of contributions is paid for any period, proper adjustment shall be made in connection with subsequent remittances. Adjustments on account of errors in contributions required of any employee may be made by direct payments between the employee and the Board.

Topic: Cal OES Form 130: Designation of Applicant's Agent Resolution

#### **Summary**

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) requires an update to their Form 130, in which the Board of Directors authorizes the positions eligible to serve as representatives for the District in disaster relief and recovery projects.

This resolution will supersede Resolution 2018-05 approved on January 22, 2018 by the Board of Directors.

#### Discussion

In the attached resolution, Staff recommends the Fire Chief, Division Chief and District Accountant as the authorized agents for the District. The authorized agents are tasked to work directly with FEMA and Cal OES to secure reimbursement for eligible disaster recovery or grant funds. Most recently, FEMA awarded the District \$125,000 for COVID-eligible expenses, and \$363,000 for emergency response staffing and supplies during the January 2023 winter storms.

#### Conclusion

Staff recommends that the Board approve Cal OES Form 130: Designation of Applicant's Agent Resolution for Non-State Agencies as presented.

Chief Neels provided a staff report regarding the 2023 Annual Report. Public Information Officer Atchison provided an overview of the Annual Report. Chief Ederer highlighted the Operations Report; Fire Marshal Briner and

Dispatched and cancelled enroute, no emergency found, controlled burning, steam mistaken for smoke, EMS call where party has been transported





This advanced tool increases our ability to conduct lifelike evolutions in the medical emergency arena, improving our skills and outcomes in the field.

Additionally, we use this interactive technology when evaluating potential new firefighter and firefighter/paramedic candidates.





#### **SEASONAL STORM RESPONSES**

Q1 was a busy storm season for Montecito. From late January into early February, a series of storms produced significant rainfall and severe wind in our area and consequently led to flooding, down trees and lines, and various nuisance storm impacts.

While storms normally impact the South Coast, Montecito personnel continue to commit to additional upstaffing in preparation for and response from forecasted events.

In February, the operational area mobilized the local IMT in coordination with the NWS forecast. Over 20 MTO personnel were part of this collaborated event.



### NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

## FEBRUARY 11, 2024 CRP - GREENHOUSE INCIDENT

Early on the morning of Sunday, February 11, 2024, Engine 91 and Battalion 95 responded with Carpinteria-Summerland Fire to a reported structure fire in a greenhouse at 4994 Foothill Road.

On arrival, Battalion 95 was assigned as incident Safety Officer, while Engine 91 was directed to make access from the east side of the property and perform fire control on the Charlie side of the incident. Engine 91 conducted an exterior operation due to the building being structurally compromised, and there being no imminent life safety issues. After three hours at scene, all Montecito Fire resources were released. Other cooperating agencies included Ventura County Fire, Santa Barbara City Fire, Santa Barbara Sheriff Office, and American Medical Response.



### NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

#### TRAIL RESCUE

On February 10, Montecito Fire was dispatched to a trail rescue at Tangerine Falls. A 28-year-old male fell about 30 feet and suffered a hip injury. Along with our partners from Santa Barbara County Fire, we hiked to the patient and rendezvoused with Copter 3 who hoisted him out and transported to the hospital. We were also assisted by Santa Barbara County Search & Rescue and AMR.

In a social media post about the incident, we reminded community members about the hazards of increased water flow in our local creeks and storm channels.

#### **VEHICLE INTO STRUCTURE**

On the afternoon of February 15, Montecito Fire responded to the area of North Jameson and Sheffield Drive where a driver had suffered a medical emergency and subsequently drove through a wall and into a residence. No one was in the home at the time and no injuries from the incident were reported. After confirming that there were no injuries, firefighters secured the structure, including utilities. With the assistance of CHP, SBC Sheriff's deputies, AMR and Smitty's Towing, the truck and trailer it was towing were lifted over the wall and towed away.

#### **OWL RESCUE**

On the evening of March 25, a community member brought an injured owl to Station 92. The bird was found near the Cold Springs debris basin hurt and weak. Our firefighters safely placed the owl in a cardboard box and gave it water using a syringe until Santa Barbara County Animal Services could arrive. The owl was transferred to Santa Barbara Wildlife Care Network for treatment and rehabilitation. We're grateful to the community member who rescued the bird, and to our local animal rescue partners for getting it on the road to recovery.

#### MARCH 30, 2024 STORM EVENT


Although not specifically forecasted, a strong convective storm event progressed through Montecito over a 12-24 hour period.


Collaboration from Carpinteria Summerland, Santa Barbara City, and Santa Barbara County Fire Departments allowed us to be successful in providing effective service.

On behalf of the Montecito Fire Department, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to your team for providing refuge for at least eight people needing temporary refuge during the storm on Saturday, March 30, 2024. It was a prime example of what makes our Montecito community so exceptional and underscores our appreciation for the Miramar's enduring support.

In speaking with our firefighters working that night, I learned that your staff stepped up and received four people who had been rescued from their vehicles on Highway 101 near the San Ysidro exit amid rising floodwaters, plus a local family whose home had flooded. Given the quickly evolving situation, we were not able to call the Miramar in advance to request your assistance. Instead, our Firefighter Dustin Barthel showed up at your doorstep with four individuals who had just survived a harrowing experience on the highway and asked one of your staff if they could help the individuals get warm and dry. Dustin said your team immediately produced towels and welcomed everyone to warm up by the fireplace. He was truly moved by how quickly and without question Miramar staff jumped into action to help total strangers. We asked for your help again that night when a family needed to evacuate their flooded residence. We took them to the Miramar where your team received them with open arms. The family had recently moved to Montecito and surely understands now what a truly special place this community is to call home.

Our firefighters were responding to call after call Saturday night and wished they could have more adequately thanked everyone at the Miramar at the time for helping us at a moment's notice. Your team's willingness to help and efficient actions allowed us to continue responding to emergency calls. Plus, you gave our firefighters peace of mind knowing that those eight people had a safe place to wait out the storm. Thank you for your extraordinary kindness and hospitality. We are grateful the Rosewood Miramar is part of our community.
